## Teamsters launch cross-Canada organizing drive of Fedex workers

On September 14, 2009 Teamsters Canada launched a full-scale campaign to organize FedEx Canada after receiving numerous phone calls and emails from their workers wanting to enjoy the same working conditions and fair treatment enjoyed by Teamster members at Purolator and UPS.

In comparison, they've made a good decision as FedEx Canada workers continue to fall further and further behind their union counterparts.

Based on the last Purolator negotiations, where employees won a 12.25% wage increase,

improved benefits and a 20% increase in pension contributions over four years, the average FedEx Canada worker recently received only a 1-1.5% increase in wages, a 30% reduction in pension and issues with the co-pay system to the benefits and pensions. UPS has similar increases to that of Purolator in their contract.

With corporations apparently getting greedier the need to unionize has never been so great!

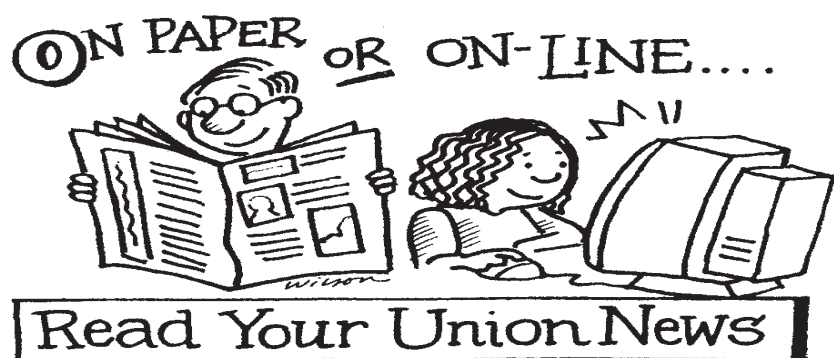

Those members have now been taken off their jobs and are working on the FedEx organizing campaign with their wages being paid by Teamsters Canada.

While the FedEx organizing drive is ongoing, the Local is also involved in many other organizing activities.

The Local remains heavily involved in community events throughout the Lower Mainland. I truly believe that our involvement in the community with the use of our tractor trailer unit pays huge dividends to the Local. While attending these events is personally gratifying, the general public in attendance leaves these events with a much more positive view of unions (Teamsters). I applaud you for settling the issue constructively, securely and with the utmost effectiveness.

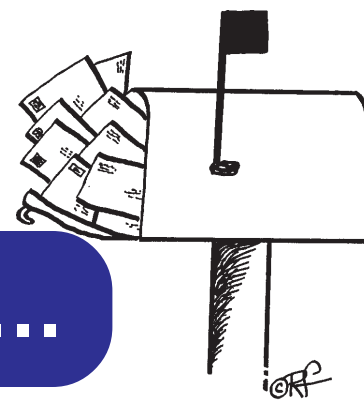

After numerous letters and meetings between the Company and the Union, the Union applied to the Canada Industrial Relations Board on May 11, 2009. Prior to the hearings, President Hennessy attended a meeting with C.F. President Darshan Kailly and they were able to reach an agreement. As a result, Bro. Manson was reinstated to his position at CF on July 15, 2009 with full reimbursement of wages and pension amounting to more than \$27,000. Bro. ## 2009 Plan Improvements

As you know, the Trustees of the Teamsters' National Benefit Plan meet regularly to discuss the Plan's benefits and finances. As a result of input from the membership, a review of the Plan's finances and changes in the benefits industry generally, the Trustees approved the following Plan improvements:

\* Effective January 1, 2009, the Weekly Indemnity rate for Plans A and B increased from \$435.00 per week to \$455.00 per week. The increased rate is limited to disabilities incurred on or after January 1, 2009.

\* Effective January 1, 2009, the maximum benefit payable for any eligible person for Basic and Major services performed in any calendar year increased to a combined limit of \$3,000.00 for Plans A and D. The increased rate

is limited to Basic and Major Dental services performed on or after January 1, 2009.

In addition, effective January 1, 2009, the lifetime benefit payable for orthodontic services for any eligible person was increased to \$3000.00 per lifetime. This includes only services performed on or after January 1, 2009.

\* Effective June 1, 2009, the accepted per visit fee is increased from \$30.00 to \$40.00 for chiropractor, physiotherapist, massage therapist, podiatrist, naturopath, speech therapist and acupuncturist.

## Benefit Plan Abuse Impacts All Members

While most members of the Teamsters' National Benefit Plan have valid claims and continue to



abide by the rules of the Plan, we are sometimes faced with the issue of Plan abuse.

These problems take

various forms:

\* The Plan not being advised when a spouse has coverage under another benefit plan

\* The Plan not being advised of a marital break-up or other situations where dependents are no longer eligible for coverage

\* The disability claimant who attempts to deceive physicians and in turn claims adjudicators in order to access benefits

\* The disability claimant who

returns to work without notifying the Plan and continues to cash disability cheques

\* The member who ignores their agreement with the Plan to repay benefits on receipt of ICBC or WCB settlement, leaving the Plan with legal costs to pursue recovery of the money

\* Altered receipts or other documents.

Those of us at the Plan's office do our utmost to prevent abuse of your Plan, nevertheless it does occur. Recovering the resulting overpayments is costly and impacts all members. The continuing financial stability of the Plan is critical to future Plan improvements and to the provision of benefits to those members who have legitimate claims and truly need the coverage.

Let's all work together to end misuse and exploitation of your benefit plan!

## Improvement to Claim Processing for Prescription Drug Coverage

As you are aware, the Plan provides coverage for drugs approved for sale in Canada for the treatment of illness or disease which are available only by prescription and when prescribed by a physician. Drugs determined to be "Lifestyle" drugs such as those for weight loss and those for cosmetic purposes are excluded.

Your prescription drug card when presented at the pharmacy provides direct payment for those drugs covered under the B.C. Pharmacare formulary. Until

recently, for payment of non-formulary drugs, the Plan required confirmation that a member's physician requested Special Authority from Pharmacare. Once the Plan received confirmation of Pharmacare's response, whether approval or denial, the Plan would provide coverage for the drug.

The Plan's Trustees have recently agreed to address members' concerns over the difficulty of the Special Authority process.

As such, effective March 1, 2009, having ones' physician request



Special Authority from Pharmacare will no longer be required for coverage of non-formulary drugs. However, direct payment through your Drug Card will not work unless a reply to a Special Authority request has been received.

If members do not wish to request Special Authority, the Plan will provide coverage once a member pays for the drug and submits the receipt to our office on an Extended Health claim form. Please contact our office if you require forms for this reimbursement process or, if more convenient, forms can be downloaded from the Benefits link at [www.teamsters31.ca](http://www.teamsters31.ca)

If you do not wish to request Special Authority from Pharmacare (as noted above) expenses for those drugs will not go toward your Pharmacare deductible.

## Pension Quick Facts

\* The Teamsters' National Pension Plan is a Defined Benefit Plan which means that contributions are received from employers only. Employees do not contribute or "pay into" the Teamsters' National Pension Plan. Contribution rates are based on what has been negotiated in your collective agreement.

\* Under the Income Tax Act, persons who are self employed including dependent contractors (Owner/Operators) are not permitted to participate in Registered Pension Plans.

\* Have you remembered to verify who your designated beneficiary is on the Teamsters' National Pension Plan? Pursuant to Pension Legislation, if you have a spouse at the time of your death, your spouse is deemed to be your

beneficiary unless he or she waives that right. If you do not have a spouse, then your designated beneficiary shall be entitled to a death benefit. If no beneficiary is named, the benefit shall be paid to your Estate.

\* Pension statements are mailed to active members annually. As such, it is very important that the Plan has your current address on file. This will ensure that updated Pension Statements are distributed in an efficient and timely fashion.

\* In the event that you terminate your employment, you may elect to become a Terminated Member of the Plan. You will automatically become a Terminated Member if a period of two years has passed during which we have not received pension contributions on your behalf. The other way to

become a Terminated Member would be by applying for a Voluntary Termination prior to the two year period previously mentioned. Becoming a Terminated Member allows you to move the commuted value or lump sum value of your pension. Please note that pursuant to the Plan's rules, portability (or moving the lump sum) would not apply to someone who has reached normal retirement age (65) unless their monthly pension is less than 4% of the YMPE (Yearly Maximum Pensionable Earnings) as established by the Canada Pension Plan. The Plan rules stipulate that any monthly pension under the prescribed limit will not be administered and will be paid out in a lump sum.

### Majority of union members are women

*Statistics Canada/CALM*

The majority of union members in Canada are now women, which has been the case since 2006. 2.15 million women and 2.07 million men are union members. Women's unionization rate (30 per cent) also exceeds men's (28.7 per cent).

Unionized women are closer to achieving pay equity than non-unionized women. Women in unionized full time jobs average 94 per cent of union full-time men's average (\$23.36 versus \$24.83).

The wage gap is much bigger for non-unionized full-time women who earn only 81 per cent

of non-union full-time men's average (\$18.16 versus \$22.50).

The average unionized worker is paid \$23.58 an hour while the average non-union worker is paid \$18.98. Full-time union workers' average wage is \$24.15. Full-time non-union workers average only \$20.55.

Part-time union workers' average wage is \$19.99. Part-time non-union workers earn dramatically lower pay of \$12.56.

Unionization has risen slightly among young workers aged 15 to 24 rose to 13.5 per cent. It fell for all other age groups.

## Equipping effective stewards

On Saturday June 13, 2009 the Local held a Shop Steward Training course at the Union Hall in Delta. The purpose of the course was to provide Shop Stewards with skills and knowledge and to assist them in being more effective and comfortable in dealing with their employers and co-workers. Topics included:

- \* the roles and responsibilities of a Shop Steward;
- \* identifying a grievance;
- \* the grievance procedure; and
- \* investigating, drafting, presenting and settling a grievance.

A Shop Steward Seminar was held at the Union Hall on Sunday, June 14, 2009 and included discussions on Workers Compensation Appeals and the duty to accommodate. The Local also welcomed Dr. Gary Namie of the Workplace Bullying Institute in Bellingham, Washington for an informative and valuable session on bullying in the workplace. Dr. Namie discussed many issues, including what bullying is, why it happens, its effects and how to deal with it.



Over 40 Shop Stewards attended over the weekend. Attendees included individuals who had just become Stewards as well as Stewards with many years of experience. The Local's In-House Counsel, Karlene Bateman taught the course on Saturday and presented topics at the seminar on Sunday. Also present throughout the weekend were President Stan Hennessey, Secretary-Treasurer Rod Blackburn, Organizer Jure Kelava and Business Representatives Cheryl Popeniuk, Tom Brown, Anthony Kirk, Terry Tyler and Richard Van Grol.

The Local would like to thank all the Stewards who attended for their interest and dedication. The Local also requests that any suggestions you may have for future Shop Steward Seminar topics be passed on to your Business Representative.

# First contract reached at ContainerWorld

After several days of negotiations, beginning last year, ContainerWorld Forwarding and Teamsters Local 31 have finally signed a Memorandum of Agreement on March 3, which was voted on and ratified on March 8 by 71 members in attendance.

The 130 workers were previously represented by another union. They were not satisfied with the representation or the conditions in the collective agreement they had. As a result, they contacted Local 31 for help. We were pleased to be able to come to their aid. We now report that the members have over 65 changes to the old

collective agreement, with improvements included, but not limited to

- \* enrolment in the Teamsters National Benefit Plan, which provides weekly indemnity – something new for the membership

- \* enrolment in the Teamsters Pension Plan

- \* wage increases

- \* posting language

- \* increase in banked overtime

- \* numerous changes to the

language to improve working conditions

Containerworld serves primarily the beverage industry, unloading ocean containers and domestic trucks. It supplies the BC Liquor Distribution Branch,

restaurants, bars and private liquor stores. The warehouse is Canada Customs-bonded and offers a full range of inventory storage and distribution. It occupies the largest warehouse in B.C. under one roof – more than one kilometer around the outside perimeter.

Local 31 looks forward to the future, attending to the concerns of our new members and improved conditions in the future.

Special thanks go to bargaining committee members John Lamb and Tyson McLaren for their assistance and to President Stan Hennessy who helped to finalize the agreement with the Company.

# Pactow owner jumps from bridge (bungee that is)

On March 7, 2009 Ron Ainey, owner of Pactow Transport Services, plunged 143 feet into the freezing depths of the Nanaimo River, after having been pushed.

In 1969, Pactow Transport was started by Ron Ainey's father and supplied trailer services to Seaspan International Ltd. Ron began his career as a driver alongside many men who are now the company's most senior drivers. When his father passed away, Ron took over the day-to-day operations of the family business. Today, with over 35 drivers and locations in Vancouver, Swartz Bay and Nanaimo, Ron is busy running the longtime Teamster company.

Ron shared how he was over the moon when his eldest son, Cody, began work at Pactow as a yard hostler. At age 24, Cody was a fun-loving kid and liked by all around him. His older co-workers, many of whom started off working

for his grandfather, kept him in line and made sure he did his share of the workload. Cody was a damn good worker and a proud Teamster, who grew up around the trucks.

In December, 2008 Cody Ainey died unexpectedly. With over 300 friends, family and co-workers in attendance, it was standing room only at his celebration of life.

Father Ron Ainey confided that no parent should ever have to bury one of his children, and that it is the hardest thing a family would ever have to do.

"We really wanted to find something to keep the memory of Cody alive."

In memory of Cody Ainey, Ron raised \$5,125 for B.C. Children's Hospital by bungee jumping off the Nanaimo River Bridge.

There was a large turnout of



co-workers, friends and family to witness the jump and cheer Ron on. While the spirit was willing, the body was not, and, in the end, Ron was actually pushed by the jumpmaster. He fell 143 feet at a speed of 50 kilometres per hour and plunged head first up to his waist into the freezing Nanaimo River.

I think Cody would have gotten a real kick out of the jump knowing that both Ron and he were absolutely terrified of heights. The jump was a huge success, but Ron vows never to do it again.

## Union member by day, title-shot boxer by night



**Editor's Note:** Teamsters Local 31 is proud to feature some of our members and their accomplishments away from the job. Darren Darby is a Purolator Courier driver and was featured in *The Province* sports section on June 14th this year, and we were given permission to reprint his story in 31NEWS.

Darren Darby has so many people in his corner that it might not be long before they get a mailbox and a stoplight there.

The Surrey boxer, a Purolator truck driver by day, is so upbeat that you start to wonder if he can be beat. He's got an ever-growing entourage — tag them Team Darby — lending whatever hand they can as he chases down his dream of winning a Canadian title. The support group is led by his understanding wife, Denise, and four young sons, but there's also a kick boxer, a mixed martial artist, a power lifter, a naturopath doctor and a host of others. Throw in a partridge and a pear tree and there might be a song.

Darby does have a 5-11-3 career record. That can't be ignored.

But he has a plan and, for the past year or so, a whole lot of backing, and that together can be a powerful thing.

"When I win that belt one day, I'm going to hold it up for a second and then I'm going to pass it into my corner and make sure everybody gets to touch it, like they do with the

Stanley Cup," said Darby, 32, who has six rounds scheduled with Calgary's Steve Claggett on the undercard of Rumble at the Rock VI next Friday.

"And then I'm going to run around in the stands and make sure everybody there gets to touch it, too. When I win that belt one day, I'm going to ask them to make me a bigger belt, one that can fit a bunch of people. There's a lot of people involved in this."

Darby gets much of the expertise, merchandise and gym time for free or at a dramatically discounted rate. People have bought in. It's easy to do.

He's usually out the door before 2:30 a.m. every morning to drive a truck for Purolator.

He finishes up by early afternoon. He trains for a couple of hours. He goes home for an hour or two to be with his family. He goes back and trains some more. He's usually home and in bed by 9 p.m.

Darby vehemently contends that the whole thing doesn't happen without Denise, who carries much of the responsibility of running herd over Ethan, 2; Maximus, 3; and Kaden, 5. Darby's son from another relationship, Jahkai, 10, lives in Toronto but is coming here for a chunk of the summer, adding yet another dimension.

Did we mention Denise also makes Darren's boxing shorts? People really are chipping in wherever they can.

"Darren is a great friend and

his group of family and friends really care about him and how he does," said Jody Cranston, a noted power lifter who is Darby's strength trainer.

in Oregon.

Sobral says that a win over 4-0-0 Claggett would help the make Darby's case for a title try.

Sobral might be a tad biased.

"Darren is a guy who is always there for you, so we are there for him. Boxing is an extremely dangerous sport so we want to give him all the support we can."

Darby insists that he's "100 times better than his record," and, with this group backing him now, he swears he could win the lightweight (135-pound) Canadian Boxing Federation title if given a shot. The championship currently sits vacant.

Manny Sobral, the promoter behind the Rumble at the Rock series, backs up Darby, insisting that he's hung tough with solid competition, guys like Aris Ambriz, a 10-0-0 Californian who beat Darby with a fifth-round technical knockout last November

He's coached Darby some. Then again, it's difficult to find somebody he's met who hasn't wanted to help him.

"I think Darren is a throwback to the old-time fighters who would travel the country and box just about anyone in their backyards," said Sobral, the former Canadian Olympic welterweight.

"Most of his bouts have been against undefeated, up-and-coming prospects, and he's held more than his own.

"This match gives Darren a chance to box an undefeated fighter in his backyard.

"Darren has a world-class punch that gives him a shot against just about anyone he steps into the ring with."

## Teamster member skis for Team Canada at Special Olympics

**Editor's Note:** Bro. David Boudreau is another member from Purolator Courier who has achieved much in the sporting world. Thank you to Local 31 Trustee Lynda Field and the Purolator newsletter for submitting this article.

David Boudreau was shy as a child. To help him overcome his shyness, Bro. Boudreau's father enrolled him in the alpine skiing program at Special Olympics BC (SOBC), a registered charitable organization dedicated to providing individuals with intellectual disabilities the opportunity to celebrate personal achievement through positive sports experiences.

"Skiing was a huge challenge for me," Bro. Boudreau recalled, "but I soon discovered that everyone in the program had a hard time learning."

"My coaches gave me a chance. They were patient and helped me learn. Skiing opened up my world and my dreams."

Bro. Boudreau began training for the Special Olympics three years ago, dedicating three to four evenings a week to his intense training regimen. In December 2007, he began his career with Purolator as an AM sorter and skillfully managed to continue training while working full-time at Purolator's Port Kells terminal.

"My job comes first, then sports," said Bro. Boudreau. "A lot

of athletes find it difficult to get a full-time job. It's particularly tough to keep a full-time job that pays well. And Purolator is a great place to work. Everyone's nice. If I need help, I get it."

The 25-year-old athlete left for the Special Olympics National Winter Games on Feb. 24, 2008 hoping to realize his dreams, and came home with an impressive four-medal win. David captured Olympic gold in the men's super-G, silver in the men's downhill and two bronze medals in the men's slalom and giant slalom.

Never forgetting the way skiing changed his life, he now chooses to give back to the community in which he lives and works. "Now I teach children

with Down's syndrome how to ski. I want to give back. I want to see the children smile and have a good time."

Bro. Boudreau will ski for Team Canada in Idaho from Feb. 2 to 13 at the 2009 Special Olympics World Winter Games. He now works in the Air Ops Division at the Richmond Hub.

# HBC Teamster member sets record for Special Olympians

Bro. Marc Thériault of Delta has been involved in Special Olympics for the past 14 years. Marc is the first athlete in Special Olympics British Columbia history



to win gold medals at five World Games in three different sports.

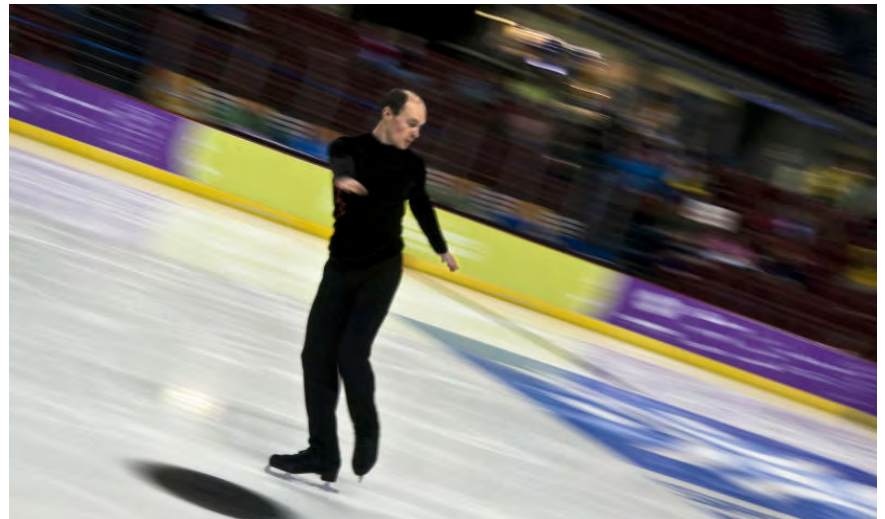
Marc currently participates in figure skating, curling, softball and soccer. Some of Marc's most memorable moments in Special

Olympics happened at the 1999 World Summer Games in Raleigh, North Carolina where he hit the game winning inside-the-park homerun to win Gold for Canada along with his teammates from the Kelowna Grizzlies Softball Team. This was followed by a Gold Medal in Figure Skating (Level 5 -Singles) at the 2001 World Winter Games in Anchorage, Alaska – where Marc successfully landed the first-ever double-jump in Special Olympics International Competition. The results of this competition changed the structure of Special Olympics figure skating in the singles category as we see it today. This led up to his next world appearance at the 2005 World Winter Games in Nagano, Japan where he competed again in figure skating – this time in two categories (paired up with his fiancé, Alexandra Magee – where they won Gold at Level 2) and Marc also won a Silver Medal in Level 6 Men's Singles.

Marc's next appearance was at the 2007 World Summer Games in Shanghai, China. Together with

his teammates from the Surrey Vipers Soccer team, where they battled on to win Gold in a shootout

2010 Olympic Winter Games. He was nominated by The Hudson's



– Marc scored the game winning goal against Team Peru. Marc's last appearance at a World Games happened in 2009 at the World Winter Games in Boise, Idaho – where he regained his world title in Figure Skating (Level 6 Singles) by winning Gold for Special Olympics Canada.

Since 1997 Marc has been employed as a Material Handler for The Hudson's Bay Company in Richmond, BC. Marc very much appreciates the support he has been given by The Hudson's Bay Company – who have allowed him time off for training and competition when necessary.

In his down time Marc also enjoys spending time with the friends he has made through Special Olympics. Marc also assists both Special Olympics Surrey and Special Olympics BC in many charity events to help raise funds and awareness of Special Olympics in various communities throughout British Columbia.

On July 28, 2009 – Marc was chosen as a Torch Bearer for the

Bay Company as their first choice to represent the company in the torch run.

While competing and winning in the highest levels of Special Olympics Figure Skating, in all disciplines, Marc is now working towards his Senior Silver Free Skate and Senior Silver Dance levels in the Skate Canada test system. To top off all of his successes, Marc was inducted into the BC Special Olympics Hall of Fame in 2008.

Marc lives with his parents, Karen and Gérard, who support him in all of his efforts. Marc is engaged to his skating partner and fellow Special Olympian, Alexandra Magee. Marc has a sister, Amy, brother-in-law, Doug and one niece, Sydney – whom he adores.

Marc's positive attitude is contagious to those who are around him. His friends and family credit his achievements to his drive and determination to succeed. Despite all of the recognition that Marc receives, he remains a modest and down to earth individual.

## Braving the chill for a friend

When Purolator Burnaby shop steward John Lam learned that his friend and co-worker Ken Rombough had been diagnosed with colorectal cancer and an inoperable tumor in his hip, he knew he wanted to do something to help.

Bro. Rombough is 56 years old and has worked for Purolator/Gelco Express for 21 years, making many friends on the job. With this diagnosis he also learned he had only about two months to live.

**Before:** Bro. John Lam in a stylized mohawk just before getting his head shaved for Saint Joseph's Hospice in Comox

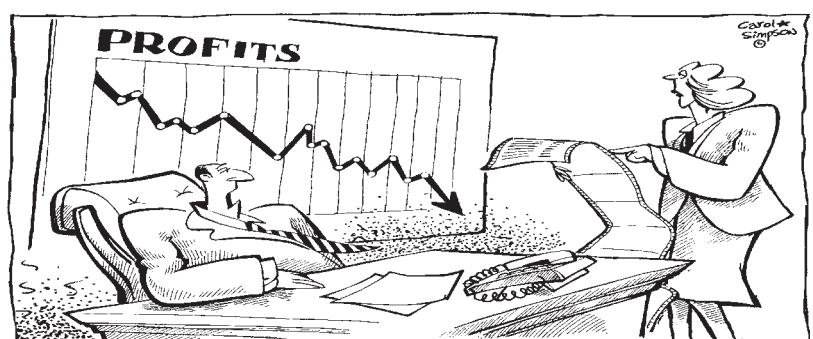

Her teachers say that a review of her accomplishments shows that she would be well-suited to many professions. Her



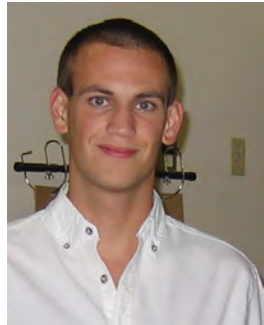
work ethic is excellent and she consistently dedicated herself to the culture of her high school by
